Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity Matthew 18.15-20

Has any other word ever become so loaded with negative associations as the word Church?

It harks back to an era of power exercised by bishops, priests, councils and synods: power to regulate and to control, admit or exclude, condemn or exonerate, and rule the spiritual lives of its members. It seems strange that Our Lord is said to have referred to the Church when there was no Church. The word only occurs twice in St Matthew's Gospel, and nowhere else in any Gospel.

Jesus says to St Peter, "Upon this rock I will build my Church," and in today's passage advises a person with a grievance against a fellow believer to tell it to the Church.

Jesus spoke Aramaic and the Gospel is written in Greek, which has no special word for Church. The Greek word "ecclesia" simply means a gathering of people.

All the earliest English translations used the word congregation or assembly, and "Church" didn't arrive until the Authorised Version. Today's NRSV (New Revised Standard Version) has kept it.

Perhaps all this may look like nit picking; and yet, how different would the popular perception of "Church" be, had the translators stuck with congregation, or even Friends, as the Quakers have it?

The advice which Our Lord gives in today's passage clearly assumes a fairly small group such as the congregation of an Anglican parish church, a local community in which the members know and relate to one another, even when they are obliged to wear masks. Notice that his advice is addressed, not to the church {congregation} but to an individual who feels wronged by another within the fellowship.

The goal is to achieve reconciliation through discreet meetings with a few chosen members of the community, who may as a last resort decide to share it more widely. Only if this fails is he to cut himself off from his neighbour.

Well, that's what the scripture says: but it's strange advice from one who was at ease when eating and drinking with the outcasts of society.

Surely this is St Matthew's strong attachment to Jewish tradition getting the better of him. Jesus, the Lord of the Church, never abandoned anyone.

So long as his people remain non-judgmental there is always the prospect of return to the fellowship. And the Church should look at its own shortcomings before excluding certain categories of "sinners" and denying them the sacraments.

One of the fathers of the Eastern Church said, "Sin is not an evil to be punished, but a sickness to be cured."

We are all in need of that cure and should never be afraid to seek it – we know that we shall never be turned away.


Christians in Creation

Last year in September, for the first time across the Lark Valley and North Bury Team Ministry, we kept the Season of Creation. In it we consider and give thanks for God's creation and then seek to deepen our Christian understanding of caring for our environment, bearing in mind that this is one of the Five Marks of Mission. And it does us no harm to consider this because the coronavirus pandemic may have caused us to take our eye off the environmental ball.

The Season of Creation, or *Creationtide*, owes much to the collaboration between Pope Francis and Bartholomew, the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople. Anglicans and many other Christian denominations have been inspired by the example of these leaders of the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches. Archbishop Justin Welby has affirmed "Reducing the causes of climate change is essential to the life of faith. It is a way to love our neighbour and to steward the gift of creation."

Five years ago Pope Francis published Laudate Si': on care for our common home. This derives from 'Laudate Si' mi' Signore' meaning 'Praise be to you, my Lord.' This is a reference to the 'Canticle of Creation' by St Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of all who have a concern for the environment, whose feast day on 4th October marks the end of Creationtide.

Pope Francis addresses people of all faiths or none because the earth is our common home which we all share. He reminds us of the links between




politics, economics, globalization and climate change, the depletion of natural

resources including water, and the loss of biodiversity – all of which lead to inequality of peoples and poverty for many. It is the poorest in the world who are the ones most likely to be affected by climate change.

Pope Francis also focuses on the theology of the gospel of creation and on how this is expressed in our scriptures. Our faith challenges us to follow Jesus who lived in harmony with creation. We are called to live with less and to curb our consumerist desire for the benefit of others. Perhaps this is something which the pandemic is teaching us.

There is much more in this encyclical for Christians to consider as we all try to live our Christian lives in what is increasingly being called the 'new normal' which affects us all. If we feel daunted these words of Pope Francis can encourage us: 'In the heart of this world, the Lord of life, who loves us so much, is always present. He does not abandon us, he does not leave us alone, for he has united himself definitively to our earth, and his love constantly impels us to find new ways forward. *Praise be to him!*'

The 2020 Ride and Stride goes ahead on Saturday, 12 September 2020.




