# All Saints' Tide

Many years ago I wrote a poem about the great three days - not the Easter Triduum, but these at the other side of the year:

All Hallows' Eve, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

The poem's title was was 'Incorporation', which indeed joins all together. The Church being the Body of Christ, members of past and present are identified together, incorporated.

All Saints' tide is a confirming of the great events of Holy Week, Easter and Pentecost, which opened the Kingdom of Heaven to all believers. We now celebrate the great company gone before us, the many thousands like varied lights that have shown the way, some with great brilliance and some fainter, or hidden. No wonder they have been compared with the stars in the sky.

Because of lingering folklore connections with ancient pagan belief (from the Celtic New Year, Samhain, and the night preceding) Hallowe'en often has connotations more to do with fear of ghostly spirits than with holiness. Sainsbury's is overflowing with hideous masks and pumpkins. But the word 'Hallowe'en' means 'Eve of All Holy Ones', or 'All Saints' Eve', - like Christmas Eve. Great days always had their preparation the day before.

'Saints' in New Testament writings are any who have come to believe in Jesus; they are the sanctified. Soon some became especially venerated for giving their lives as martyrs. The practice arose of celebrating the Eucharist sometimes on martyrs' tombs, especially on the anniversary of death. A more powerful statement linking with the death and resurrection of Christ it's hard to imagine.

When the Barons, with the Archbishop, came to Bury St. Edmunds in November 1214, to the shrine of the martyred king Edmund, the oath they then took (to force King John's acceptance of people' rights) was most powerfully binding as well as strengthening of resolve.

The holiness of saints is always recognised, officially (as by Catholic criteria) or unofficially, by popular acclaim. Many people have known someone they would call a saint, often in humble obscurity. Many known saints have been thought difficult to live with. Histories of saints often hold reverent exaggeration, to the point of implausibility, but what cannot be denied is the strengthening of faith in ordinary blessing is felt after some people. Often shrine, while Christians pilgrimage to a frequently relate to some particular saint.



In church we regularly observe saints' days in the calendar, not only the Book of Common Prayer red-letter days (mostly of the 12 apostles), but also the large number commemorated through the year in the Church of England's official book 'Exciting Holiness'. Though our Church does not now canonise, there are many entries of holy ones of recent centuries.

All Souls' Day, which used to be a quiet time of remembering, perhaps with a solemn Requiem, has now become much more publicly important. All our departed loved ones can be given recognition, and our transient mortal state acknowledged. Death comes to all, whatever their beliefs. There are reverent rituals regarding the dead all over the world, whether to keep the departed close or send them to a far-away holy realm. We all keep at least memories and keepsakes, besides having to accept the parting.

But for Christians the incorporation remains. As the writer to the Letter to the Hebrews put it (beginning Ch. 12) ...

'Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith'.

We are joined with those before us into the Body of Christ. Thanks be to God.

# Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA) Report on the Anglican Church

This Report was published on October 6th, and I know many of you will have read it, if not, I urge all of you to do so. It can be found <u>HERE</u>. Reading it is painful, but nothing to the pain suffered by those who are victims and survivors of abuse perpetrated by clergy and lay church officials which has been ignored, covered up, and not addressed. I welcome the Report and the mirror it holds up to the Church of England.

The House of Bishops have met and unanimously endorsed a motion fully accepting the IICSA report, unreservedly apologising to victims and survivors for the harm done by the Church and committing itself to urgently implementing the recommendations. The House specifically engaged with the two most significant themes from the Report: proper redress for victims and survivors and establishing a new structure for safeguarding decision-making that is independent of bishops and church bodies including the Archbishops' Council. The House endorsed rapid action on redress, to build on the interim arrangements recently set up by the Archbishops' Council. It also unanimously agreed with the proposal that the Church should move towards an independent safeguarding structure, with a new trustee body responsible for safeguarding to take over responsibility from the Archbishops' Council.

The Report states, "The culture of the Church of England facilitated it becoming a place where abusers could hide" and that culture change "will need continuous reinforcement of the abhorrent nature of child sexual abuse and the importance of safeguarding in all of the Church's settings". That there continue to be significant numbers of cases of abuse, and of church leaders perpetrating abuse or failing to respond to victims and survivors properly, means we have a very long way to go to become the safe church our Gospel demands. This is about

changing ingrained culture and attitudes, and the Report engages with these issues thoroughly. I am determined that we root these attitudes out of this Diocese and ensure that no parish or benefice and no individual fails to comply with the requirements of training and safeguarding practice.

I am completely committed to ensuring we properly respond to and care for victims and survivors. For too long their voices have been marginalised or ignored. The steps we are taking are designed to ensure this never happens again and that the needs of victims and survivors are central to all our processes.

We have been taking steps in the Diocese to respond vigorously to the recommendations, under the leadership of the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer, Karen Galloway, and our Safeguarding Panel, chaired by former Chief Constable Simon Ash.

The IICSA Report also addressed the Church in Wales and there were eight main recommendations. The first two are addressed to the Church of England, that the post of diocesan safeguarding adviser be strengthened and its independence be ensured, and be called "diocesan safeguarding officer", and that the Clergy Discipline Measure should be amended in relation to safeguarding complaints. I would heartily support the first, and the second is underway. There are two recommendations to the Church in Wales, about the structure and policies of safeguarding and about record keeping. The last four are addressed to both Churches, that there be a formal information-sharing protocol between the two Churches, that there be information sharing protocols between Churches and statutory bodies, that there be funding and support for victims and survivors, and that there be, or continue to be, independent auditing of safeguarding practice. There are further points raised under a consideration of the seal of the confessional and the recruitment, training and continuing professional development of clergy, and cathedrals, amongst other areas.

I strongly urge you to read and consider the whole of this Report, and most especially I ask your prayers for all victims and survivors of abuse as the Church works quickly to produce just practices of support and redress and a thoroughgoing change in culture.


